The American Jewess (1895-1899)

The American Jewess (1895-1899) described itself as "the only magazine in the world devoted to the interests of Jewish women." Founded and edited by Rosa Sonneschein (1847-1932), it offered the first sustained critique, by Jewish women, of gender inequities in Jewish worship and communal life. This digital reproduction of the 8 volumes was assembled and digitized for online access by the Jewish Women's Archive.
